Edmunds St. John,

That Old Black Magic 2007 (\$20) is a must try for those interested in wines that are made to be an expression of the vineyard and season that produced it. Made from 71% Syrah and 29% Grenache sourced from three different locations in Northern California. A dark, full bodied wine with hints of smoke and a long finish.

Chateau Pesquie,

Cotes du Ventous Terrasses 2007 (\$15) is made from 70% Grenace and 30% Syrah. A great everyday wine that is easy to match with different types of foods. Medium bodied with flavors of ripe berry fruits and wonderful aromatics.
